# Excerpts from Nadia Iqbal's reflections

# **Session Overview**

10/12/2013- ... the seminar task was an online practice test to be conducted as a group. The group were relatively quick in making their decisions and thus more time was spent on the discussion of the questions after the test was marked and the grade given... 12/12/2013- ... I thought another approach would be best. I thought it would be better to show the students the question they got wrong, and the possible answers leaving them to have another discussion about the answer they thought would now be correct, and after showing the actual answer. This did lengthen the seminar, however proved to be helpful. The online score for the test was quite high and both the lecturer and me were pleased with the class's performance...

### What went well

12/12/2013 This seminar activity proved to be very successful as it really stimulated students thinking further, allowing them to critique their answers and think in more logical manner. This is a helpful technique that will assist them further throughout the course.

What might you do differently in future?

10/12/2013- Even though the class finished the practice online test quickly, the lecturer and myself both felt that a group effort was missing. The class did not engage in discussions with each other but would raise their opinion singularly and then would vote as a class on the final answer. The lecturer and I tried to prompt the class in working together and even gave them the example of our last seminar, however they continued to work singularly. In the future we agreed that it may be beneficial to encourage students to sit together to create a group atmosphere than have left the students to sit where they pleased, being away from each other.

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# An interview with:

# Socrates Economou

Program Leader of BA Marketing

We started off the interview by discussing what the Senior Lecturer thought about the SLAs and the SLA scheme. This is what Socrates had to say: "I find SLAs very beneficial because they have been through the previous year's work themselves. The students can relate to them-there is less distance between the SLA and the students, they are like the 'Middle-Man'."

On further discussion, Socrates pointed out that because the SLAs have had their own experience, they would be able to predict what help is needed by the students and as a result students feel less embarassed to ask an SLA for support.

For our Senior Lecturer, the SLA Scheme is also a learning experience for the SLAs: "The SLAs enhance their own learning experience as being in the role refreshes their memory of the module, this assists them with their own studies; they also gain communication skills which enrich their ability to tackle different scenarios from day-to-day, as well as enhancing organisational skills."

When I asked Socrates to rate the SLA scheme on a scale of I to 10 (1 being the lowest), he said: "8 out of 10, because the SLA Scheme helps to prevent lecturers and tutors from being overloaded with issues such as referencing. Having an SLA can support with these kind of things and allow thelecturers and tutors to focus on the core subject."
