KINGSTON PERSPECTIVE Two heads are better than one. And six are better than three. It is with this idea in mind that Simbo Ajayi, Magda Durka and Faith Warner of Middlesex University Peer Assisted Learning (PAL) team met with Jenny Stowar and David Eleftheriou of Kingston University this May. The aim of the visit was to compare the services offered to students by both universities and learn from each other. It was quite amazing what we discovered from our visit; that different people, from different universities, when pondering the same question of how to improve student academic experience seem to come up with very similar ideas, albeit with different names. We have 'SLAs' they have 'academic mentors', we have the StudyHub (and previously the Learning Lounge) offering help

with academic writing, maths and library services, they have SEC Academic Success Centre run by SEC (Science Engineering and Computing). It seemed both universities agreed on the benefit of employing students to provide guidance on a range of queries throughout the campus. Looking specifically at peer-assisted learning with Kingston University, known as 'mentoring', we were pleasantly surprised to find that the services offered by mentors to 'mentees' matched the services offered by SLAs almost exactly. Kingston implements an 'opt in' scheme for mentors to maximise the support for students using the services. Their mentoring involves supporting students during drop-in sessions with groups of around 5-10 mentees/students having their own assigned mentor who would

run session specifically tailored to their needs. The idea of an 'opt in' scheme may be something we wish to consider at Middlesex especially for first year students who will benefit from having access to a mentor. Middlesex provides broader training to include generic and subject specific aspects of the role, which Kingston would consider for the future, In conclusion, the whole experience was beneficial for both Kingston and Middlesex University and we hope to continue to push the quality of the scheme forward and to make a difference to academic excellence and students experience within the University.

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After a month of planning and organising it was fantastic to see the award ceremony come to life. There were moments where we thought that not everything was going to run as smoothly as we had hoped and on the day there were some technical difficulties that caused some stress for the planning team! However with the dedication and perseverance of the Senior SLAs, the evening ran smoothly without any issues. It was a welcomed change to see our SLAs in black tie attire, we've just had the official photographs back and everyone really did look incredible. WORKING WITH ACADEMICS

Adding the student touch to the employability e-portfolio.

Working in partnership with staff from Criminology and Sociology, Centre for Academic Practice Enhancement and the Employability Service a team of SLAs introduced the Employability e-portfolio to 1st year students.

Drawing on their e-portfolio experience SLAs created Mahara e-portfolio pages and LinkedIn profiles to show 1st year student how to create their own portfolios. Over the summer SLA are leading a number of projects including:

The skills matrix project. The project lead Lea Stundner, Senior SLA, Science and Technology says "the skills matrix is a great tool to easily identify a student's skillset. It will help students to record evidence of how they acquired/used skills and function to prepare students to answer standard interview questions".

Tricia Hague, Senior SLA, Arts and Design, is leading a project to create 'day in the life' practitioner/alumni experience videos. She says the project 'aims to motivate students by helping them to visualise their lives post-study'. She plans to give a few criminology and sociology alumni a Go-pro camera to record reflection of their day. These are used to create a series of vlogs and videos demonstrating different employability options and career avenues.

How do we capture student attention and encourage regular portfolio updates? Oliver Garner, SLA, Arts and Design, leads a project that attempts to use visual prompts to highlight skills and remind students to update their portfolios.

Both Oliver and Trisha have started to capture student stories in two minute bite size videos and digital stories. Currently they are interviewing students with work placement and voluntary experience. Students asked to share how they secured these posts and tips for making the most out of work opportunities available at the university and in the local area.

Tricia and Oliver are keen to develop an EmployMe App to link the different aspects of the employability e-portfolio together and prompt students to keep a monthly record of the skills they develop.

Yusaf Ejaz Mohiuddin, SLA, Criminology and Sociology, recently joined the portfolio team. Yusaf leads a project that looks at organising work experience for students interested in a teaching career.

A big thank you from the e-Portfolio Project Team to the SLAs for their hard work on this project.

It was always going to be a challenge, landing a job as a digital forensic investigator - but that has been my career ambition ever since I first became aware of this specialised area of work and the battle against cybercrime in the late 1990s.

Having successfully completed my degree in Computer Forensics in 2012 and being invited to be part of the Student Learning Assistant Team, the road to employment in a position where I could demonstrate and hone my skills in the real world has been a long and often fruitless one.

How many CV's did I write? How many job applications? How many times did I receive those words no one wants to hear? Too many.

But persistence and a cool head is all part of being a digital forensic examiner - thus I knew that one day, if I persevered, someone, somewhere would see the potential in me and give me the one chance I needed to shine. I would like to highlight that my experience as a Student Learning Assistant was crucial and determinant in my life. After

that memorable experience, I have never doubted my ability, self-confidence has never been lacking...but when you apply for hundreds of positions and are only met with rejection it is sometimes a bitter pill to swallow. So...

You can imagine my huge, unbridled joy when told that Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) had decided to go where no other firm had yet gone and offered me a position within their hallowed walls! Such feelings of dizzy happiness do not come around very often but that one moment of sheer delight swamped me for days after...and I am pleased to say I still feel that sense of joy.
